MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY IRELAND MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

Mission Statement

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland aims to provide information and support to people with neuromuscular conditions and their families through a range of support services. Muscular Dystrophy Ireland's objective is to promote through practical empowerment, independent living for people with the condition muscular dystrophy.

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland supports advocating for services to enable people with neuromuscular conditions to fully participate in society and to live a life of their own choosing. Muscular Dystrophy Ireland also aims to support and fund research into neuromuscular conditions.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNMENT AND MANAGEMENT

The Council and Board

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland has a National Council which meets four times per year and its role is to determine policy. The members of the National Council are elected at the AGM. The Chairperson of each local branch is automatically a member of the National Council. The National Executive Members of Muscular Dystrophy Ireland are elected at the AGM and sit on the National Council.

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland is directed by a voluntary Board which is known as the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee comprises a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Treasurer, Secretary and there is allocation for a further three members. This Executive Committee meets once a month to determine the management, good governance and financial control of Muscular Dystrophy Ireland.

The Executive Committee met on 10 occasions during the year.

The Executive Committee does not receive travel and subsistence expenses for attending meetings.

Management

The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for the day to day management and operation of the organisation throughout the National Office and Regional Offices. The National Office is the base for all administration and support services of the organisation.

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland has five regional offices, in Cork, Donegal, Galway, Tullamore and Kells. There is also Muscular Dystrophy Ireland staff members based in the mid-west and southeast regions. Family support is available throughout all HSE regions of Ireland, while youth support is available in the east, south, west, midlands, northeast and north-west.

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Code of Governance

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland signed Governance Code Principles Statement in March 2013 and confirm that "our organisation complies with The Governance Code for the Community, Voluntary and Charitable Sector in Ireland".

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the organisation included:

Information and Awareness

First ever World Duchenne Awareness Day was held on the 7th September. The aim of the day was to create awareness of the condition. Muscular Dystrophy Ireland marked this occasion by the planting of Japanese maple tree on the premises. We had Cllr Paul Hand representing the Lord Mayor of Dublin to do the ceremony. Muscular Dystrophy Ireland staff also released balloons to mark the occasion.

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland continues to raise awareness about Muscular Dystrophy Ireland and in 2014, the Information Officer, Family Support Workers and Youth / Respite Workers attended schools around the country to provide information and support. Awareness talks were given to 80 Teachers and Special Needs Assistants in 3 schools around the country. The Information Officer gave talks to 70 students of Physiology and Health Science in IT Carlow as part of Science Week. A talk was also given to Clinical Measurement Students in Dublin Institute of Technology. This course qualifies cardiac and respiratory scientists. Educating allied health professionals is an important part of the work Muscular Dystrophy Ireland does in creating awareness of Neuromuscular Conditions.

Muscular Dystrophy Ireland also used the Home from Home Apartment as a resource in educating allied health professionals. 30 Occupational Therapy students from Trinity College and a group of 8 Occupational Therapy Assistants from the Portobello Institute visited MDI Centre and were given a tour of the Home from Home Apartment and an awareness talk from the Information Officer.

Member Supports

MDI support for members try to ensure the highest standard of services possible for people with neuromuscular conditions and their families.

MDI Members meet their TD's Day

In September 2014 MDI organised a TD's day in Buswell's Hotel for members to meet their local political representative in an accessible environment. At this event, the report of the National Survey was launched and a pre-budget submission was distributed to all in attendance. MDI members had the opportunity to speak with 25 politicians from a variety of constituencies and parties and were given the chance to voice their concerns on a number of issues affecting them.

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Medical Card Review

In July 2014, the HSE began a review of medical card provision. The aim of this review was to develop a framework for medical card eligibility to take account of medical conditions. An expert panel was set up to prioritise certain conditions based on medical need.

Home from Home

The Home from Home Apartment had its busiest year to date. During 2014 Home from Home Apartment provided accommodation for 480 guests spread over 280 nights. Home from Home Apartment has also seen an increase in other organisations wishing to avail of the accommodation. The Home from Home Apartments has the desired effect of being centre of excellence for any person with disability. In 2014 Home from Home Apartments have offered many of the guests a valuable insight into independent living. Many of these people for the first time in their life had the opportunity to leave their homes and to come and spend time in user friendly self-catering environment.

These consist of regular Yoga Group Meetings, Computer Courses run over three week period and a Family Support Group. In addition to these activities we've seen other local community groups using the facilities of our Training Room. These groups have been primarily focused on providing information and quality services to people with disabilities. There have also been visitors from local education institutes which have been interested in the supports and facilities we provide. 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Transport and equipment

The transport service is co-ordinated from Dublin by Mr. Darren Lyons. Transport is available for members to and from clinics, hospital appointments, transport links, social outings and also dropping Muscular Dystrophy Ireland loan equipment such as hoists or wheelchairs to hotels or members' residences. Muscular Dystrophy Ireland also has some equipment which members can borrow for short to medium term loan periods. This includes standard hoists, travel hoists, shower chairs/ commodes, wheelchairs (adult/child/manual/power), profiling beds, ramps and scooters.

Statement of Accounting Policies

1 **Accounting Policies**

1.1. Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention

1.2. **Incoming Resources**

Income is accounted for when the organisation has entitlement, there is certainty of receipt and the amount is measureable.

Grants from statutory bodies are credited to income in the year to which they relate.

Membership subscriptions are taken to revenue in the year in which they are received.

1.3. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

1.4. **Support Groups**

The company had 5 regional support groups during the year.

The net incoming/(outgoing) resources of the regional support groups are included in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.5. Stock of Fundraising material

Stock which comprises of Fundraising material, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.6. Grants and Deferred Income

Grants in respect of the funding of the company's operations are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period it is received for.

Grants and donations received towards the cost of furnishing motor vehicles and capital equipment are credited to deferred income. They are amortised to the Statement of Financial Activities over the useful lives of the assets.

1.7. Taxation

The company is exempt from Corporation Tax as it has been granted Charitable Status by the Revenue Commissioners under Charity No 6489

1.8. Fund Accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted Funds:

Restricted funds represent Grants and other funders which can only be used for the particular purposes specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of Muscular Dystrophy Ireland.

Unrestricted Funds:

Unrestricted funds represents amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the National Executive Committee, in furtherance of the objectives of Muscular Dystrophy Ireland.
